Our community programs have navigated another challenging year with the lasting pressures of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite another year of shifting service delivery and how frontline staff connect with women and community, outreach staff have done an exceptional job ensuring women. children, and families remain connected to services and are able to build safer lives for themselves and their loved ones.

Beyond our existing programs and services, the Women's Centre of Hamilton and Flamborough Women's Resource Centre have welcomed many new services to further support the unique experiences of women including the S.T.E.P. Employment Program, the Mobile VAW Worker, the Black Women's Community Outreach Worker, and a new MentorAction team lead. We have also revised our peer training course to help engage more peer support volunteers and make the service more widely available. These services aim to provide more community specific supports so that more women can access safety planning, gender-based violence services, and more intensive, wrap-around supports. We have also strengthened partnerships with many community service providers to ensure women receive service where they feel safest. And with the changes to the Divorce Act and the expanded definition of family violence, our legal advocate has been working hard to ensure women have better access to justice and legal supports that recognize the impact of family violence.

With all of these exciting changes, a final addition will be the launch of our new website where women can access program specific information and self-refer online. The pandemic has impacted our visibility and accessibility and we hope this change will further support accessibility and speak to our continued efforts to eradicate gender-based violence and build safer communities and lives for all




